He will be in the hospital about a week, then in rehab for another week. He has been is so much pain and the doctors say that the medication he has been taking will eventually become ineffective. He injured this knee years ago when working at Gate City Steel Corp.

By June I had recovered sufficiently to attend the national meeting of Graduate Women in Science (GWIS) held at Chapman University, Orange, CA. I was presented the National Award of Recognition and a beautiful Bulova wall clock with a meaningful inscription. GWIS also established a National Fellowship in my honor which will be awarded for the first time in 2002. As a member of the organization for 55 years I served as its national president in 1983-84. and was awarded honorary life membership, the organization's highest honor in 1986. GWIS was oroginated at Cornell University in 1921 and later extended to other universitites throughout the country. It includes both men and women in the mathematical, physical, biological, and social sciences.

In June I also attended the national meeting of the Institute of Food Technologists in New Orleans and included a visit with my cousin, Jerry Thornton. My autobiography YOU NEVER FAIL UNTIL YOU STOP TRYING *The Story of a Pioneer Woman Chemist* -was published in June. However, June also brought bad news. My office building at Cornell, MVR Hall, was found to have developed structural damages so a move into another building was necessary. The remainder of the summer was devoted to the move from my three offices

The year brought sadness in the death on October 18 of my beloved mentor and teacher, Dr. Louise Daniel. She was retired and living in California. Her birthday, October 28 and mine, October 27, were always celebrated together. This year was my 80th and her 90th. Approximately 50 friends dropped by to celebrate mine. The ages ranged from 4 months to 92 years, representing 8 countries

The weatherman sent us a gorgeous fall with magnificant colored leaves, warm sunny days and abundant harvests of apples, grapes, pears, potatoes and squash. As yet, we have had no snow but we hope for a "white Christmas."
