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El Prado, NM, 4/11/97 SNOW, SNOW, and MORE SNOW Spring hasn't sprung Winter hasn't went



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Dr. Monday visits WBC

Dr. Nell Mondy of Ithaca, N.Y., has been present this week for the dedication of the Mondy - Carroll Lectureship at Williams Baptist

College, Walnut Ridge.

Or. Mondy is professor emerita of nutritional science, food science and toxicology at Cornell University in Ithaca. She has been on the faculty at Cornell for more than 40 years. She is a summa cum laude graduate of Ouachita Baptist University with both bachelor of science and bachelor of arts degrees in chemistry. She holds a master's degree in biochemistry from Texas University and a doctorate in biochemistry from Cornell.

The Mondy - Carroll Lectureship at Williams Baptist College is made possible by an endowment from Dr. Mondy, who established the lecture series in memory of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Mondy, her cousin, Bill Carroll, and deceased cousins who lived their lives in the Pocahontas and Walnut

Ridge area.

Other cousins who are honored with this lectureship are Lorrell Haynes Withers (1922 – 1991); Houston H. Mondy (1920 – 1954); James D. Mondy 1922 – 1995); Jessie Mondy Thornton (1919 – 1995); and Alma Lee Mondy Vycital (1925 – 1990).

Dr. Mondy's father, Daley D. Mondy (1889 – 1924), was a successful school teacher. Known for his mathematical skills, he served two elected terms as Randolph County tax assessor. At the time of his death he was the owner and operator of the largest restaurant in Pocahontas.

Her mother, Ethel Carroll Mondy (1889 – 1972), was a Bible scholar and an expert gardener. She taught Bible classes at First Baptist Church in Pocahontas and later at First Baptist Church of Ithaca. She was employed by the *Pocahontas Star Herald* for about 20 years. She left Pocahontas in 1943 to follow her daughter, Nell, to Texas and then New York.

Dr. Mondy's cousin and classmate, Bill Carroll (1921 – 1990), lived in Pocahontas most of his life. He was owner – publisher of the *Pocahontas Star Herald* from 1963 – 73 and mayor of Pocahontas from 1976 –80. A noted contractor, he built some of the finer structures in Pocahontas.

Dr. Mondy joined members of the Williams faculty, the Mondy and Carroll families, and others at a banquet Monday evening, hosted by College President Jerol Swaim and Williams College in Mabee – Gwinup Cafeteria.

The banquet was followed by the program dedicating the lectureship in Maddox Fine Arts Center.

Invocation was by Aaron Epps, a sophomore, pre-medicine major. Welcome and History of the Lectureship was given by Swaim. Introduction of the lecturer was by Henry Tillinghast, associate professor of biology at Williams. The speaker, Dr. Raymond Bloomer Jr. lectured on "Modern Science and the Shroud of Turin."

Dr. Bloomer is professor of physics and astronomy at King College in Bristol, Tenn. He holds a bachelor's degree from The Citadel and M.S. and Ph. D. degrees from the University of Florida.

During 20 years as a career officer, Dr. Bloomer rose to the rank of lieutenant colonel in the U.S. Air Force. He served his early years as a physicist in the optical components branch of the Air Force Weapons Laboratory in New Mexico. Later, he joined the faculty of the U.S. Air Force Academy where he attained the positions of professor of physics, director of research and deputy department head. While he was at the academy, the physics department studied the Shroud of Turin.

The program was closed by a presentation by Alyce A. McHaney, chair of the Department of Natural Sciences at Williams.

JESSIE ANN PEMBERTON TO UNDERGO RADIATION TREATMENT

Noal called me last night just as I was putting the Chronicle to bed to give me an update on Jessie. She went into the hospital the week-end of April 6 for a colonostomy but was kept for further tests and observation. After multitudinous tests, scans, and other observations, the doctors discovered a vaginal tumor which was found to be malignant. The six doctors concerned were unanamous in their decision that the malignancy had not spread and decided not to remove the tumor but to treat it with radiation. The treatment begins next Monday with daily radiation for five days (Monday through Friday) for five weeks.

This is the extent of my knowledge at present but I will keep you up-to-date as her treatment progresses.

I run a help yourself style house but I can't quite get use to finding a stranger looking for food in my refrigerator. I think at times there must be a sign somewhere advertising free food. Their friends are well behaved and like I said, polite, so I don't mind them hanging around.

Everyone is well now. Dad has gotten over his case of pneumonia, Brian's turf toe is getting better, I'm better after getting the flu, Katie is going to be alright after running face first into a wall, and Emily is victorious over her allergies so far this year. Emily is useing the allergy treatment that slowly introduces what she is allergic to into her system until she builds an immunity to the pollens. We started some months back now and as the allergy season begins for us here she is doing real well. There is no runny nose, waterery eyes,or the other things that she is usually plagued with at this time of year.

We watched the Hale-Bopp comet as many nights as we could. We especially enjoyed the night when you could see the comet, Mars, and the Lunar eclipse all at once. We used binoculars to watch with and were in awe of such wonderful sights. I would say that it seems impossible that anyone could view such things and not believe in God, but then you hear of those people in California. For me it is hard to believe the things that they believed. I am a skeptic from the word go. I don't think there are aliens (at least as they are being presented) and I don't believe in UFOs. I guess I will have to be abducted before I am convinced. According to tonights news, Phoenix is a hot spot for sightings so who knows.

This year's weather has been strange. Right now it is raining and about 57° out. Mind you I'm not complaining. The hot weather will be here soon enough. I like the weather about the 89° mark. The longer it is cool, the better I like it.

Your comment about the sealing of Christ's tomb interested me. Indeed, it may have been the only tomb sealed at that time (See Matt. 27:51-53). The Jews wanted to be sure that he was dead and that it could not be said that someone had stolen the body or that he was not dead before being taken off the cross (See Matt. 27:62 - 64).
